


Corrugated Lines 2017 Author and presenter information (in alphabetical order)

She was the winner of the 2010 Berlin International Literature Festival's poetry slam <i>Slam!Review</i> in which she competed as the first-ever Australian entrant among contestants from ten countries.</p>

Australian singer/songwriter **Missy Higgins** is one of the most successful and acclaimed female singer/songwriters in Australian music history. She has enjoyed phenomenal success with her irresistible melodies and 'arrow through the heart' lyrics, delivered by a striking voice that clearly means it. Missy has sold more than two million albums and singles globally, had multiple #1 hits and won 9 ARIA Awards.



Shane Howard has forged a reputation as one of Australia's great songwriters and a creative and passionate commentator of the times. He is held in high regard throughout Australia, and during the past 30 years, has worked tirelessly to define a distinctive Australian voice as an artist, writer, producer, engineer and mentor.



Dan Lee is a playwright based in Melbourne who began his writing career while working at the Broome public Library. His first play "Bottomless", set in the Broome Sober up centre, will premier in Melbourne in early 2018 and the play "Grey Nomad" will open in LA in September this year.



Kim Mahood is a multi-award winning writer and artist based in Wamboin, near Canberra. Her latest book, *Position Doubtful* was shortlisted for the 2017 Victorian Premier's Award for non-fiction and won the 2017 Australian Book Industry Award for the Small Publishers' Adult Book of the Year.



Vanessa Margetts studied visual art at Curtin University majoring in photography and textiles. She went on to study Landscape architecture at UWA and currently runs her own design studio in Broome. Vanessa exhibited at galleries across Australia including the Art Gallery of WA, Federation Square Gallery Melbourne, Fremantle Art Centre and Cullity Gallery at University of Western Australia.



Rani Middleton is an English and Drama teacher who currently enjoys sharing her passion for storytelling with her students as a Barking Gecko Theatre Teaching Artist. She is the regional ambassador for Black Swan Theatre Company and a committee member of Backroom Press and Theatre Kimberley. Rani has been involved with Corrugated Lines right from the beginning and last year took on the role of co-coordinating the festival.



Bruce Pascoe is a Bunurong, Yuin and Tasmanian man born in Melbourne. He is a member of the Wathaurong Aboriginal Co-operative in Victoria and a director of First Languages Australia. He has written more than 30 books and his celebrated work *Dark Emu* won the NSW Premier's Literary Award - Book of the Year in 2016.



Charmaine Robson is a Sydney-based historian who teaches and researches in Australian history. Her PhD thesis, completed in 2012, explored the work of Catholic missionaries in Hansen's disease care in twentieth century Australia, a project that brought her to the Kimberley region for the first time.



Sandy Toussaint is a professor of anthropology, author and curator. She has worked in the Kimberley intermittently since the early 1980s, including for Indigenous organisations and national and state inquiries. Sandy is the author and/or editor of five books.



Jacqueline Wright came to the northwest as a teacher/linguist. Her first novel, *Red Dirt Talking*, earned her first prize in the TAG Hungerford Award (2010) and was long-listed for the Miles Franklin (2013). She now works with ABC Kimberley where she was thrown into the deep-end of the film-making pool and found it much easier to swim than she imagined.
